The Kentucky Cancer Program District Cancer Council is launching the seventh annual public awareness campaign to increase colon cancer screening with Dress in Blue Day on March 6th. She will join Council partners and numerous other organizations, businesses, schools and churches throughout the community to encourage everyone to wear blue. March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, time to call your doctor and ask about a screening test that's right for you. Routine screening is highly effective.

Early colon cancer usually has no symptoms, so it's important to be screened. Age is the most common risk factor. It is recommended that everyone age 50 and older be screened. If you have a personal or family history of cancer, or certain risk factors such as polyps (growths) or inflammatory bowel disease, you should check with your doctor about getting screened at an earlier age.

Dress in Blue - tell your friends why and call your doctor today to make an appointment. Don't let fear, embarrassment or any other reason keep you from taking the next step.
